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# FACULTY INSIGHTS

## BROWN ENGLISHMEN: HOW ONE 1835 MEMO STILL DECIDES WHO GETS HIRED IN INDIA

On February 2, 1835, Thomas Babington Macaulay submitted a brief policy note that would reshape Indian identity for centuries. His "Minute on Education" argued for English-medium instruction to create "a class of persons Indian in blood and colour, but English in taste, in opinions, in morals and in intellect." The British needed intermediaries- colonial subjects who could administer an empire without fully belonging to it.

Nearly two centuries later, Macaulay's ghost haunts every job interview, every school admission, every anxious parent choosing

"English-medium" over vernacular education. The language you speak still determines your salary, your social mobility, your perceived intelligence. A brilliant engineer from a Tamil-medium school loses opportunities to a mediocre English-speaking graduate. Corporate India demands "good communication skills" a code for anglicized accents and idioms.

The 2020 National Education Policy's push for mother-tongue instruction sparked fierce resistance, revealing our internalized colonial hierarchy. Parents fear vernacular education will handicap their children. Regional politicians cry linguistic imperialism when Hindi is imposed, yet embrace English as "neutral." We've replaced British rulers with a new elite, those who code-switch effortlessly, who don't carry the shame of "vernacular medium" on their resumes.

Macaulay succeeded beyond his imagination. He didn't just create an administrative class; he engineered a permanent linguistic anxiety, a cultural cringe that equates English fluency with merit and vernacular roots with backwardness.

The question isn't whether English is useful- it demonstrably is in a globalized world. The question is: can we decouple language from worth? Can we build a India where your mother tongue doesn't determine your ceiling? Until then, we remain what Macaulay intended perpetually translating ourselves for validation.

What's your experience with language and opportunity? The debate continues.

## HACKVEDA' 26 SHOWCASES STUDENT INNOVATION AT GREATER NOIDA CAMPUS

HackVeda' '26, a prestigious national-level hackathon organised by the School of Computer Science and Engineering (SCSE) in collaboration with IBM and Amazon Web Services (AWS), was successfully held on January 29 and 30, 2026, at the Greater Noida branch of the university. The two-day event brought together student innovators from institutions across the country to develop technology-driven solutions to real-world challenges.

The hackathon witnessed participation from 30 competitive teams working in emerging and high-impact domains such as agentic ai, artificial intelligence, cloud computing, cybersecurity, data science, internet of things, and full-stack development. Teams were required to ideate, design, and build functional solutions within a limited timeframe, encouraging the practical application of theoretical knowledge in a simulated industry environment.

A key highlight of HackVeda' 26 was the strong industry engagement. Nearly 50 software



engineers and domain experts mentored and evaluated participants throughout the event. Their guidance on architecture, scalability, innovation strategies, and industry best practises added significant value to the learning experience. Participants worked continuously, including overnight development sessions, reflecting the intensity of real-world product development cycles.

The event concluded with final project presentations before a panel comprising academic and industry experts. Teams were evaluated on innovation,

technical implementation, problem relevance, usability, and presentation quality. The top ten teams were awarded prizes, certificates, and recognition from IBM and AWS.

Notably, students from SCSE at the Greater Noida campus were among the winners, highlighting the institution's strong academic and practical training framework.

Overall, HackVeda' '26 strengthened the connection between academia and industry while fostering teamwork, leadership, and innovation, making it a significant milestone for the Greater Noida campus.



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## IILM SCHOOL OF LAW INAUGURATES FORTNIGHTLY DEBATE SERIES WITH INTERACTIVE MOOT COURT SESSION

The IILM School of Law organised a Workshop on Presidential Style Debating on 22 January 2026 at the IILM School of Law, Greater Noida branch, marking a significant academic development. The workshop introduced students to the philosophy and mechanics of presidential-style debating, emphasizing persuasion, clarity, and leadership over adversarial confrontation. ## PROMPT WRITING TIP OF THE MONTH

Think in layers when building your prompt. Start with the main subject, then enrich the scene by describing environment, atmosphere, and important details. Clear structure helps the AI interpret your idea more reliably.

Use concrete visual cues instead of vague descriptions. Words like soft morning light, weathered textures, or dramatic shadows produce more consistent results than general adjectives.

If the output isn't what you expect, refine rather than rewrite completely. Small adjustments to style, perspective, or mood often lead to better images.

Well-crafted prompts are iterative - clarity and specificity improve results over time.

## THE QUIET PRESSURE: MENTAL HEALTH REALITIES AMONG UNIVERSITY STUDENTS HERE

University life is often portrayed as a time of freedom, growth, and new experiences. While these elements are real, there is a quieter side to campus life that often goes unnoticed. Many students carry an unspoken pressure shaped by expectations, comparisons, and the constant need to perform.

The transition to university brings sudden independence and multiple responsibilities. Academic pressure is one of the most common stressors, with grades increasingly tied to self-worth. Fear of failure, intense competition, and uncertainty about future careers contribute to anxiety and self-doubt. Alongside this, social expectations create additional strain. 



In 2001, as email inboxes overflowed and BlackBerrys buzzed nonstop, Thomas H. Davenport and John C. Beck dropped a bombshell: attention is the new gold. Their book, *The Attention Economy: Understanding the New Currency of Business*, argued that in a world drowning in data, human focus isn't just scarce—it's the ultimate business asset. Fast-forward to 2026, with TikTok scrolls and AI notifications, and their thesis feels more urgent than ever.

Davenport and Beck cut through the noise with a simple premise: capital, labor, and even ideas abound, but attention doesn't. Companies that master it thrive! They break it down into four pillars—measuring where attention goes, understanding its psychology, deploying tech to protect it, and stealing tricks from advertisers. Real-world cases, from e-commerce giants to knowledge firms, show how firms turned focus into loyalty and profits. The book guides managers, marketers, or anyone fighting inbox fatigue by learning to “earn and spend” attention wisely.

The film *Haq* serves as a profound academic catalyst, bridging the gap between Bollywood's narrative power and the rigorous debates of political science. By dramatising the landmark 1985 case of *Shah Bano v. Mohammad Ahmad Khan*, the film provides a visceral look at the clash between secular jurisprudence and religious personal laws. While Yami Gautam's performance masterfully humanises the “marginalised citizen” and Emraan Hashmi adds a grounded strength to the legal drama, the film's true value lies in its exploration of Article 44 and the Uniform Civil Code. It highlights a pivotal moment in Indian history: Ultimately, *Haq* serves as a crucial case study on gendered citizenship and the delicate balance of constitutional freedoms, prompting us to examine whose rights are prioritized when faith and state intersect is often a conflict between the political pragmatism of the state and the progressive vision of the judiciary.

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
